NATURE FRIENDLY EAKRING

Ivy - More Than A Christmas Decoration Glossy evergreen ivy leaves are a traditional part of our Christmas wreaths but for wildlife ivy is important for food and shelter at tough times of the year.

The tiny flowers, beautifully shaped if you look close up, provide pollen and nectar late in the year when most others are over. In my garden Red Admiral butterflies were feeding on them into November. Earlier in the autumn the ivy flowers were humming with bees and hoverflies.

In January and February, after other hedgerow berries have gone, ivy berries ripen into a welcome winter food for blackbirds, thrushes and blackcaps.

Ivy's dense foliage is winter bed and breakfast for wrens and other small garden birds. A nighttime shelter with insects and spiders for breakfast.

In spring and summer blackbirds, robins and wrens have all nested in thick ivy on trees and walls in my garden.

Ivy's clinging roots don't harm the trees it climbs, they just grip the surface of the bark. I chop it back when it gets too big but always leave plenty for wildlife
